Teacher Lessons on Digital Citizenship:

Digital Citizenship-This Is Me

Objective

All Grades: Each Grade Level Has there own format on the Common Sense Education Website

Digital Citizenship This Is Me Lesson From Common Sense Education

Learning Objectives of this lesson are to consider how posting selfies or other images will lead others to make assumptions about them. Reflect on the most important parts of their unique identities. Identify ways they can post online to best reflect who they are. When and where do people take "selfies"? Why do you think they take them?

Essential Questions

How does what I post online affect my identity?

Anticipatory Set/Direct Instruction

Students will pretend they are going to take a selfie to post to a public website for anyone to see. Where would you take it? What would you be doing? What would you look like? They will get a paper cell phone to draw themselves with as much detail as possible.


Learning Activities

Objective




